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BJUP played active role in Village Development Committees (VDCs) have been instrumental in fostering grassroots leadership and communitydriven progress. These committees, comprising local leaders and community members, have taken charge of identifying and addressing village-specific needs. By actively participating in decision-making processes, VDCs ensure that development initiatives are relevant and impactful. Over the past year, VDCs have successfully implemented various projects, such as improving local infrastructure, enhancing educational facilities, and organizing health camps. Their efforts have not only led to tangible improvements but also empowered villagers by giving them a direct role in their community's development.





Women Groups/SHGs have played a critical role in promoting gender equality and economic empowerment. These groups provide a platform for women to come together, share experiences, and learn new skills. Through regular meetings and training sessions, women are educated on health, hygiene, financial literacy, and entrepreneurship. This year, several Women Groups have launched small-scale businesses, contributing to their families' incomes and boosting the local economy.

Holletic Rural Development Program

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(A Collaboration of HDFC Bank, CSR, Parivartan)



Skill Development and Livelihood Enhancement, Promotion of Education, Health and Hygiene, Natural Resource Management, Financial Literacy and Inclusion

The Holistic Rural Development Program (HRDP), a collaborative initiative with HDFC Bank's Parivartan, aims to comprehensively uplift rural regions within 15 villages of Nawada District of Bihar. This endeavor places a strong emphasis on increasing the capabilities of vulnerable communities through targeted skill development and training, equipping them to navigate the intricacies of environmental challenges. The program is designed to address the pressing issue of deepened impoverishment resulting from diminishing agricultural yields by refining techniques and resource management practices. Key elements embedded within this initiative include enhancing the infrastructure of schools and Anganwadi Centers (AWCs) to create conducive learning environments for children through Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS), promoting heightened health awareness among community members to foster better health practices and outcomes, and advancing sustainable farming improve agricultural productivity techniques to and environmental health. The HRDP is underpinned by fundamental pillars, each crucial to the holistic development of the targeted communities: improving educational infrastructure and resources to ensure quality education for children, providing skill development and training to enhance the livelihood opportunities of community members, focusing on health awareness and improving water and sanitation facilities to ensure a healthier living environment, and implementing effective management practices for natural resources to promote sustainability and resilience.



Community Empowerment Program

(A program of Responsible Mica initiatives)

Key achievements:



Child Protection and Education, Health and WASH, Livelihood and Skill Development, Women Empowerment, Natural Resource Management

The Community Empowerment Program is active in 50 villages across Bihar and Jharkhand, focusing on uplifting communities in mica-rich regions. The program adopts a holistic approach, addressing five livelihood, domains: education, social kev entitlements, health and WASH, and advocacy. It aims to elevate ultra-poor households by fostering solutions sustainable through а variety of interventions. This include asset-building support, vocational training, financial literacy sessions, distribution of kitchen garden seeds, provision of scholarships, establishment of educational infrastructure, organization of health camps, dissemination of hygiene awareness, and facilitation of access to social entitlements. The project's efforts are dedicated to creating lasting positive impacts and driving meaningful transformations within these communities.

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BACHPAN (A Program of Kinderpostzegles Netherlands)



Child Protection and Education, Health and WASH

The "BACHPAN" project focuses on the comprehensive development, protection, and care of orphaned and semi-orphaned children in seven slums of Bihar Sharif, Bihar. It addresses their challenges through kinship care for those with relatives, support for siblings in independent care, and assistance for children raised by various families. The project's strategy includes prioritizing psychological wellbeing, enhancing the social environment through awareness and workshops, and providing platforms children's self-expression. Implementation for involves engaging with child clubs and local authorities, offering life skills training and educational support, linking families to government schemes, improving educational facilities, and facilitating school and Anganwadi Center (AWC) enrollment Through these efforts, the project aims to create supportive environment that enables orphaned an semi-orphaned children to thrive and reach their fu potential. By integrating community involvement and ensuring access to essential services, "BACHPAN" no only addresses immediate needs but also builds foundation for long-term growth and empowerment The project emphasizes the importance of creatin safe and nur turing spaces where children can develo resilience and self-confidence.

"Building Atmosphere for Children to have Protection & nurturing" (A Program of Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiative)



Child Protection and Education, Health and WASH

"BACHPAN" is an initiative active in 10 slums and 30 Gram Panchayats across Nalanda, Nawada, and Patna Districts in Bihar. BJUP's objective with this project is to foster a safe and supportive environment for children, focusing primarily on orphaned and semiorphaned kids. The initiative targets child labor, among ragpickers, acknowledging its especially detrimental impact on their cognitive and emotional development. BACHPAN's holistic strategy is built on three key pillars: providing alternative care, enhancing social infrastructure through awareness campaigns, and empowering children by ensuring their active participation. Implementation involves collaborating with local organizations, offering parenting training, providing educational assistance, facilitating access to government schemes, and supporting school enrollment for children. Additionally, the initiative aims to build community resilience by establishing child protection committees, creating child-friendly spaces, and offering vocational training to older children. Regular health check-ups and counseling sessions are also conducted to ensure the overall wellbeing of the children. BACHPAN encourages community involvement, recognizing the critical role of local stakeholders in sustaining long-term change. Through this initiative, BJUP strives to break the cycle of poverty and provide a brighter future for the children in these regions.



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BACCHIE-2 Feet Ahead Together

Building Atmosphere for Comprehensive Ghild Health and Education) (A Program of Kinderpostzegels, Netherland)



Child Protection and Education, Health and WASH

The 'BACCHE-Two Feet Ahead Together' program represents a significant advancement in the holistic development of children in the Rajauli Block of Nawada district of Bihar by fostering meaningful child and youth engagement. This initiative focuses on enhancing children's resilience and mental wellbeing, highlighting the vital role of education. It seeks to build a supportive environment by raising awareness about children's mental health among stakeholders and communities, encouraging dialogue, and improving educational infrastructure. The program aims to boost resilience, self-confidence, and cognitive skills through life skills training and active participation in sports and the arts. It also underscores the importance of education by combating child labor, ensuring school safety, and supporting ongoing learning through resource centers, teacher training, and parental involvement. Additionally, the program integrates community feedback to adapt its strategies effectively and promotes collaboration among local organizations to maximize its impact. By addressing both educational and emotional needs, it creates a well-rounded approach to fostering the overall development of children.

Child Protection and Education

The Maitri Project, supported by Educate Girls USA, was launched in the Nalanda District to address the urgent issue of out-ofschool girls (OOSG). This initiative aims to overcome the complex challenges faced by young girls from disadvantaged backgrounds who are unable to attend school due to financial constraints and societal obstacles. The project is dedicated to bringing these girls back into the educational system through a three-pronged approach. First, it focuses on the identification of OOSG through rigorous, evidence-based assessments in collaboration with local stakeholders such as teachers, healthcare workers, and community representatives, utilizing door-to-door Second, the project employs a surveys. multifaceted strategy for enrollment, which includes clarifying stakeholder roles, providing capacity-building, and conducting awareness campaigns with educational materials, community camps, and teacher sensitization to promote girls' education. Finally, to ensure these girls remain in school, project offers education kits the and counseling services to address potential dropout reasons. Through this comprehensive approach, the Maitri Project aims to provide quality education and long-term support to out-of-school girls in the Nalanda District, making а profound impact on their educational journeys and personal development.





Digital Classroom Program

A Collaboration with eVidyaloka, Banglore



Child Protection and Education,

BJUP, with the support of eVidyaloka, is undertaking the implementation of the Vidyaganga and Digital Classroom Program in two schools located in the Giyak block of District. This forward-thinking Nalanda initiative is designed to provide government school children with access to high-quality digital education. The program is supported by a network of highly qualified volunteer teachers and professionals who are dedicated to enhancing the educational experience for students.The eVidyaloka these program operates on two primary fronts. The first is focused on enrolling children in digital learning platforms and equipping them with innovative educational content that is delivered through Android applications. This approach ensures that students are engaged with interactive and up-to-date learning materials that are designed to meet their educational needs in a digital age. The second aspect of the program is the development and provision of essential digital infrastructure. This includes tablets supplying and smartphones to children, as well as extending these resources to parents and the School Management Committee. By establishing this digital infrastructure, the program ensures that students have the necessary tools to fully participate in digital learning, and that parents and school administrators are equipped to support and manage this new mode of education.







Sonu Kumar, a 13-year-old boy from Lalilewar village in Jamui district, Bihar, exemplifies the profound impact that community-driven educational initiatives can have on a child's life. Instead of attending school, Sonu worked alongside his father, Mr. Shivkumar Das, in the local mica mines. His father's monthly income of approximately Rs 4000 from mica picking, coupled with the lack of proper irrigation and agricultural opportunities in their village, left the family struggling to make ends meet. The harsh economic conditions and the prevalent culture of mica mining compelled Sonu to start working at the age of 5, mirroring the lives of many other children in Lalilewar. Despite being enrolled in school, the demanding work schedule and lack of a conducive study environment at home led to Sonu's gradual disengagement from education. By the time he was 13, his academic performance had deteriorated, and he faced mental trauma due to the grueling labor and lack of support. His parents, though supportive of his education, lacked the means and knowledge to provide the necessary encouragement and resources.

The community empowerment project in Lalilewar aimed to uplift the village through education, child rights awareness, and overall development. A pivotal component of this project was the creation of a Balmanch, a forum designed to engage children with their rights and the importance of education. Sonu joined the Balmanch and began participating in meetings that highlighted the significance of schooling and child rights. The Balmanch provided Sonu with new insights into his situation and motivated him to return to school. The program facilitated additional resources, including libraries and whiteboards, to support students like Sonu. Despite initial struggles due to his extended absence from school, Sonu received support from the community, including tutoring and access to educational materials.

With these resources and the backing of the Balmanch, Sonu gradually overcame his academic challenges. His confidence in his studies improved, and he began to catch up with his peers. His parents, who had initially been skeptical, were pleased to see Sonu's progress and were supportive of his educational journey.Today, Sonu Kumar attends school regularly and is determined to make the most of his education. His story reflects a significant shift from a life of child labour to one where he is actively working towards a better future through education. Sonu Shines bright in Balmanch's guiding light

The organization and my friends at Balmanch gave me the confidence to leave child labor behind and pursue education like other children. I now believe that I can secure a bright future through schooling.

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Jeera Devi, a resident of Shahpur village in Nawada's Warsaliganj block, faced severe hardships due to her husband's alcoholism. With no financial support from him, she was left with the sole responsibility of providing for her family. To make ends meet, Jeera Devi began selling vegetables in the local village market. However, the task was daunting—she had to carry the vegetables on her head, which limited the quantity she could transport and the income she could earn.

Carrying vegetables on her head each day not only limited her ability to earn a decent income but also took a toll on Jeera Devi's health. The small quantities she could carry meant that her earnings were often insufficient to meet her family's basic needs. Additionally, the physical strain of carrying the load over long distances left her exhausted, with little energy for other responsibilities. Recognizing the challenges faced by Jeera Devi, HDFC Bank Parivartan, through its initiative of Enterprise Development for Women, provided her with a wooden wheel cart. This simple yet essential tool significantly transformed her vegetable-selling business. With the cart, Jeera Devi was able to transport larger quantities of vegetables and fruits to the market, reaching more customers and achieving financial independence

The wooden wheel cart significantly improved Jeera Devi's life. Her daily income increased to ₹250, a substantial rise that allowed her to provide better for her family. For the first time, she was able to save money, giving her a sense of financial security and hope for the future.In addition to the financial benefits, the cart also eased the physical burden on Jeera Devi, leading to an improvement in her overall health. She now feels more confident and capable, and her outlook on life has become more positive. Wooden cart, bringing hope and cheer, easing every load, happiness draws near

My wooden cart has not only boosted my income but has also eased the physical burden I used to carry every day. My health has improved, and my daily income has increased. I am deeply grateful to HDFC Bank Parivartan's enterprise Development initiative for giving me this opportunity. The wooden wheel cart has truly given wings to my self-confidence. and I am determined to continue growing my business and improving my family's life

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In rural areas like Charaiya, Jamui , Bihar, menstrual hygiene management often relies on traditional practices, which may not always align with modern health recommendations. To address this issue and promote better menstrual hygiene practices, a participatory rural game using a modified Snake and Ladder game was implemented. This case study explores the impact of this innovative approach on community awareness and practices related to menstrual hygiene.

The traditional Snake and Ladder game was adapted to address menstrual hygiene. The game board included Ladders, representing positive practices such as using sanitary pads, maintaining cleanliness, and consuming iron-rich foods. Snakes represent negative practices such as using unhygienic cloths and poor hygiene. The community facilitator and education trainer guide ensured accurate and sensitive delivery of information. The game was played in a group with adolescent girls and women, with the aim of educating them in an interactive and engaging manner. Pre- and post-game surveys were conducted to assess changes in knowledge and practices. Informal interviews and focus group discussions provided additional insights into the impact of the game.

There was a noticeable shift in menstrual hygiene practices among participants. Many transitioned from using traditional cloths to sanitary pads and became more aware of the importance of maintaining personal hygiene. The game also highlighted the importance of consuming ironrich foods during menstruation, leading to some dietary adjustments. The game fostered open discussions about menstrual health, helping to reduce stigma and encourage support among community members. Initial resistance to discussing menstrual hygiene due to cultural taboos was encountered. However, the interactive nature of the game helped overcome these barriers and facilitated a more open dialogue.

The participatory Snake and Ladder game successfully enhanced menstrual hygiene awareness and practices in the village. By combining education with interactive learning, the game facilitated meaningful improvements in knowledge and behavior, demonstrating the value of innovative approaches in rural health education. Future initiatives can build on this success to address other health issues and continue promoting positive community change.

Participatory rural game showed the way, helping girls understand menstrual health today

> " Kajal a student of UMS Charaiya shared, "Through the Snake and Ladder game, I learned about menstrual hygiene practices. Previously, we used cloths, but now I understand the importance of maintaining cleanliness and consuming iron-rich foods during menstruation. Before participating in the game, I was hesitant to discuss menstrual hygiene and lacked awareness about its significance. This game has helped overcome that hesitation and provided valuable knowledge."





A sustainable and smart irrigation system for a group of marginal and small farmers helps them earn more in comparison to using polluting diesel pumps or relying on rain to irrigate their crops. Farmers in Nawada District were heavily dependent on diesel pumps for crop irrigation. Expensive diesel engines increase farm input costs and contribute to carbon emissions. Agriculture is the main source of income for most of the area. The average landholding size is low due to the scarcity of rainfall. This also results in a high cost of irrigation. To reduce the cost of irrigation, A solar-based group irrigation system in 15 villages across Nawada District was set up through the Holistic Rural Development Program (HRDP) with the collaboration of Bhartiya Jan Utthan Parishad and HDFC Bank. The initial process involves sharing information with the Village Development Committee (VDC) and the Farmer's Clubabout the responsible utilisation of irrigation water and promoting changes in agricultural practices related to smart irrigation.

The installation of a community-owned solar-based irrigation system began with the identification of clusters, measurement of catchment area, and formation of Jal Samitis (user groups). This is followed by mapping the command area of each irrigation system and deciding on the layout for the buried pipeline. Trenching for pipeline, bore well, and pump house construction work is then done by the user group through community contributions. Usage norms include the distribution of water as per a member's needs and the nominal collection of an irrigation fee.With the active participation of and joint efforts of the local community, farmer's club, and VDC, 12 solar-based irrigation systems, have been installed across 5 villages. They can now cultivate 150 acres of farmland, which is benefiting more than 1,000 farmers.

The change began after the installation of the solar-based irrigation system. Farmers' once barren land has become fertile; the land is now cultivable. With the system, they have estimated an increase in their annual income of almost Rs 30,000. By opting for solar energy instead, the program has avoided the emission of approximately 22,315.5 kilograms of carbon dioxide (CO2) during this period. The initiatives have led to increased crop yields, promoted more sustainable water usage practices, and improved the livelihoods of farmers in the community.

Farmers feel calm with the smart irrigation on the farm



I was relying solely on unpredictable weather patterns or conventional irrigation methods that drained my savings and the Earth's precious water. Now I am happy that I have found a reliable and consistent water source for my crops. I recommend this system to fellow farmers who are ready to embrace a more sustainable, efficient, and responsible way of cultivating the land. I am grateful for the constant support provided by the team BJUP says Sakal Dev Singh, farmer from Khapura village.

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Radha Devi, a resident of fulwarya Village of Rajauli block in Bihar, She lives with her family of five. Her family relied primarily on the crops they grew on their farmland and occasional market purchases for their diet. Like many others in her community, Saro followed traditional farming methods to grow vegetables in her backyard. However, the family's diet lacked diversity, and their dependence on market goods was high.

In response to the need for improved dietary diversity and reduced market dependency, Radha Devi participated in a kitchen garden intervention program. The program aimed to enhance food diversity for families in the community by encouraging the cultivation of various vegetables at home. Saro was provided with seeds of ladyfinger, pumpkin, beans, green and red spinach, along with comprehensive training and ongoing hand-holding support. This initiative was designed to empower participants like Saro to grow a wider variety of vegetables, ensuring a more nutritious diet for their families.

With the knowledge and resources gained from the kitchen garden intervention program, Radha Devi transformed her backyard into a thriving kitchen garden. She began cultivating the new vegetable varieties provided by the program. Saro's family now enjoys a more diverse and nutritious diet, significantly enhancing their overall health and well-being. The inclusion of various vegetables has reduced their reliance on marketpurchased goods, making their diet more self-sufficient and costeffective. In addition to meeting her family's nutritional needs, Radha began selling the surplus vegetables to her neighbours at fair prices. This additional income has supplemented her primary income, contributing to her family's financial stability. The success with her kitchen garden has not only boosted her confidence but also positively influenced her community.
